The didgeridoo (or, as it is known by the traditional custodians of the Yolngu clans of North East Arnhem Land, the yidaki), is not traditionally played in Ngunnawal or Wiradjuri country. It is played here today with the permission of the Ngunnawal peoples to acknowledge and pay respect to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander men and women who have contributed to the defence of Australia in times of peace and war.
